Revised Management Report on Fund Performance

For the six months ended June 30, 2013

The Fund's interim management report of fund performance for the six months ended June 30, 2013 (the "Interim Period") has been revised to reflect that its management expense ratio (the "MER") during the Interim Period was 1.13%, not 0.88% as originally stated, and to reflect that its MER, including expenses absorbed by the Manager, was 1.13%, not 0.98% as originally stated. In addition, the annualized fees for the Interim Period described under "Results of Operations" were 1.13%, not 1.15% as originally stated.

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This revised interim management report of fund performance contains financial highlights, but does not contain either interim or annual financial statements of the investment fund. Results of Operations

For the six months ended June 30, 2013, the net asset value of the Fund for pricing purposes was \$10.93 per unit compared to \$11.25 per unit at December 31, 2012.

For the six months ended June 30, 2013, the fund had a return of -1.58% net of fees of 1.13% (annualized) while the DEX Universe Bond Index had a return of -1.68%. The bond market has adjusted to the fact that quantitative easing will be winding down in the 4th quarter of 2013. The strategy of the Fund has been to overweight corporate bonds relative to its benchmark as yields represent value relative to Government bonds. Term to maturity was shortened in anticipation of the rise in interest rates although they are expected to remain in this range for the remainder of the year.

Recent Developments

The Bank of Canada has not increased interest rates this year and has recently stated that it is likely to remain on hold given the uncertain global economic environment. Steve Poloz, recently appointed head of the Bank of Canada, was previously the CEO of Export Development Canada. He will likely maintain a steady course although given his background, he is well aware of the export challenges Canadian manufacturers are facing. In light of that, he is more likely to have conciliatory views of the current interest rate environment. The U.S. economy on the other hand has been gradually picking up momentum with job growth maintaining a consistent path. The Canadian dollar has weakened in light of the divergent paths of economic growth, which longer term will be a net positive for our economy.

Interest rates will likely be limited on the upside given our weak economic growth in the first half of 2013. The corporate bond market remains attractive given the additional interest rate differential over Government bonds. The strategy will be to remain overweight this sector to achieve higher income and potential capital gains.

Financial Highlights

The following tables show selected key financial information about the Fund and are intended to help you understand the Fund's financial performance for the past five years. This information for the years ended December 31 is derived from the Fund's audited annual financial statements.

Information for the period ended June 30, 2013 is derived from the Fund's unaudited semi-annual financial statements. For June 30, 2013, the Net Assets included in the Net Assets per Unit table is from the Fund's unaudited financial statements and calculated using bid prices while the Net Asset Value included in the Ratios/Supplemental Data table is for Fund pricing purpose and calculated using closing prices. All other calculations for the purposes of this MRFP are made using Net Asset Value.

(1) This information is derived from the Fund's unaudited financial statements as at June 30, 2013 and the audited annual financial statements as at December 31 of the year. The net assets per security presented in the financial statements differs from the net asset value calculated for fund pricing purposes. Net Assets per unit is the difference between the aggregate value of the assets of the Fund and the aggregate value of the liabilities on that date and including the valuation of securities at bid prices divided by the number of units then outstanding.

(2) Total increase (decrease) from operations consists of interest revenue, realized and unrealized gains (losses), less expenses, and is calculated based on the weighted average number of units outstanding during the year (period). The schedule is not intended to total to the ending net assets as calculations are based on the weighted average number of units outstanding during the year (period).

(3) Distributions to unitholders are based on the number of units outstanding on the record date for each distribution and were paid in cash.

(2) Management expense ratio is the ratio of all fees and expenses, including harmonized sales taxes but excluding transaction fees charged to the Fund to the average net assets.

(3) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio adviser manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the period. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a Fund.

(4) Net Asset Value per unit is the difference between the aggregate value of the assets of the Fund and the aggregate value of the liabilities and including the valuation of securities at closing prices divided by the number of units then outstanding.

Management Fees

Ridgewood Capital Asset Management Inc. (the "Manager") is entitled to an annual management fee payable out of the assets of the Fund. The maximum management fee is equal to 1.00% (excluding HST) of the weighted average net asset value of the Fund less ordinary expenses of the Fund. The management fee is calculated on a monthly basis as of the last valuation date of each month. Services received under the Master Declaration of Trust include

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managing or arranging for the management of the Fund's investment portfolio and providing or arranging for all required administrative services to the Fund.

The past performance of the Fund is set out below and indicates year-by-year returns, overall past performance and annual compound returns.

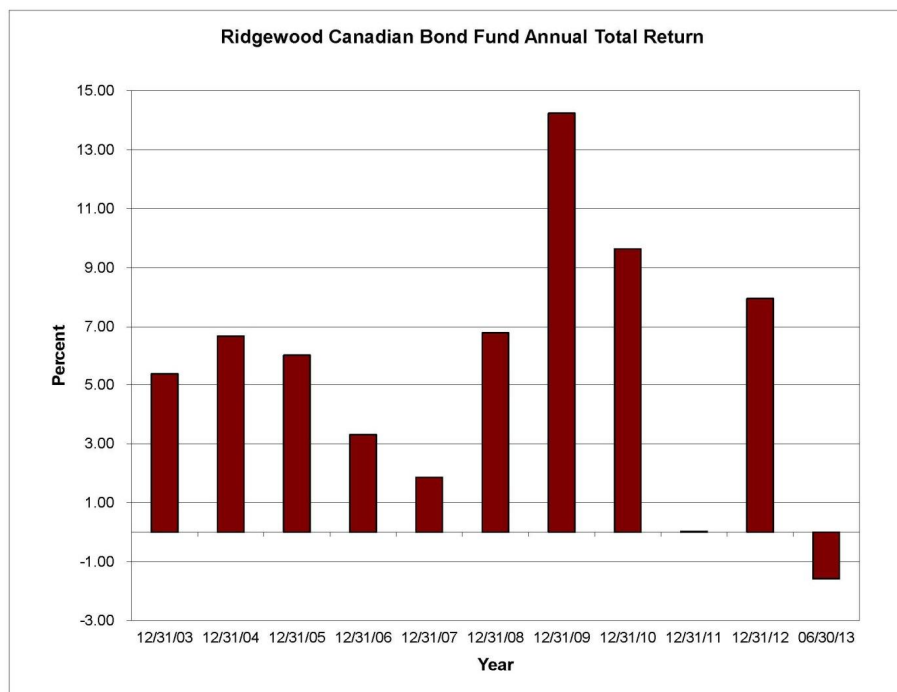
With respect to the charts displayed below, please note the following:

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Independent Review Committee

National Instrument 81-107- Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds (“NI 81-107”) requires all publicly offered investment funds to establish an independent review committee (“IRC”) to whom the Manager must refer conflict of interest matters for review or approval. The current members of the IRC are G. Tomlinson Gunn, Allen B. Clarke, and Marshall E. Nicholishen. Mr. Gunn serves as the Chair of the IRC.
